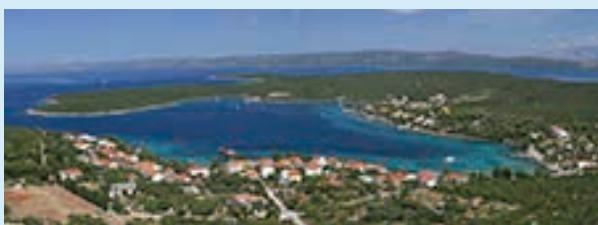




Location

Step into a fairy tale

Fall in love with south Dalmatia! An under-explored world of wild and robust nature where the blue sea and lush greenery merge into one. Magical towns with rich culture and history. Charming small towns whose simplicity will win you over. Unique people of extraordinary hospitality. Pelješac, the second biggest Croatian peninsula after Istria will thrill you with its diversity!



Location

The magic of unspoiled nature

See the diversity of plant and animal life on the Pelješac peninsula! It's an explosion of life that happens when the Mediterranean sun shines on over 1100 species of plants. This always-green peninsula, framed with clear waters, stretches over 355 km² with altitude ranging from 1 to 961 meters. Evergreen forests, olive groves, vineyards, tropical fruits such as oranges, lemons, pomegranates; almonds, carobs; medicinal plants and herbs such as bay leaves, rosemary, sage, mint; exotic cacti and palm trees!

In addition to plant life, you will be amazed by a rich wildlife. On Pelješac, especially in Lovište, the species that really stands out is the jackal – a subspecies of coyote that in this region can be found only on Pelješac. They can often be seen early in the morning during their uninterrupted vineyard walks or while crossing roads. They are nocturnal animals that move in pairs or small groups and in the night they communicate with long howling. First, one of them howls and then others respond from nearby hills. When it comes to game, mouflons, wild boars, rabbits and pheasants are common as well as eagle owls, frogs, seagulls... When walking the paths of Pelješac, you might come across an endangered tortoise, and while driving down the roads of Pelješac, aside from the jackal, you may cross paths with a newcomer from Asia – a small Indian mongoose who was brought here in the early 20th century to reduce the population of vipers. We should also mention the sheltopušik – a completely harmless snake-like lizard that lost its legs during evolution. No one is scared of it because it is a useful animal that eats snakes and other vermin. Finally, let's just say that in Lovište, you can hear the singing of 100 species of birds. Enjoy the sounds of nature!

The magic of unspoiled nature

Experience the astonishing beauty above and below the sea! On the 35 km long coastline of Lovište full of bays, many of which are accessible only by sea, you will discover a new underwater world. Among many kinds of fish, you will be surprised to see the endangered pen shell – the largest mollusc of the Adriatic Sea that can grow up to 1 meter in height and can be found only in clean waters. Pen shells are filter feeders that process up to 2000 l of seawater a day. Meet one of the oldest organisms of the Mediterranean – Posidonia seagrass, named after the Greek sea god Poseidon. Posidonia meadows are the lungs of the sea. They enrich the sea with oxygen as they can produce up to 14 l of oxygen.

Your place in the sun

If you're looking for a place in the sun, you are bound to find it in south Dalmatia! It is well known that in all of Croatia only the Dalmatian coastline and its islands are blessed with the Mediterranean climate, which gives us long, dry and warm summers, and cool and humid winters. Enjoy relatively high temperatures during the course of the entire year, which only in January and February fall below 10 degrees Celsius.

Lovište is set in a gorgeous bay sheltered from strong winds in the westernmost part of the Pelješac peninsula. You will love the contrast between the predominantly upland landscape of the peninsula and the gentle relief of Lovište with hills lower than 200 m. Due to its geographic position and the characteristics of the relief, precipitation is rare in Lovište and the number of sunny hours is very high. According to some sources, it climbs up to 3000 hours of sunshine per year, which is more than the sunniest island Hvar, located just across Lovište. Lovište has a long tradition of tourism that dates back to 1935, when the first tourist came here, mainly due to its favourable climate and the high number of sunny hours! Grab a few of those hours just for yourself!

Are you sick of mass tourism and feeling like a number? Experience tourism with heart! In this idyllic fishing village with a population of around 200, you will feel at home. Most businesses are family businesses, people work in tourism, fishing and agriculture, and are all very hospitable and friendly. Here you can find several family restaurants that prepare food according to traditional recipes, olive oil manufacturers and honey farmers as well as domestic products such as orange and lemon marmalades, liqueurs, salted fish – all made in the traditional way. Don't expect flashing lights – expect simple and subtle natural beauty. Find us – location



You can find Camp Lupis if you're coming from the direction of Split or the direction of Dubrovnik. In both cases, you turn off the Adriatic Highway and take the road to Pelješac in the direction of Orebić.

In Orebić, you continue straight to the last village – Lovište. If you are coming from the direction of Split, you can take the A1 highway or the Adriatic Highway to Ploče where you can board the ferry line Ploče-Trpanj. After a one-hour ride, you will arrive in Trpanj and from there you drive in the direction of Orebić and then toward Lovište for about an hour. This way you can get some rest from the driving, have a cup of coffee, enjoy a sea ride and avoid crossing state borders. Still, if you enjoy driving and discovering new places, you can turn off the A1 highway in Ploče and take the

Adriatic Highway in the direction of Dubrovnik, cross the Bosnia and Herzegovina border and take a turn for Pelješac. This way you will have driven across the entire island and already in the very beginning of your vacation you will have noticed its diversity.

If you decide for this option, we recommend a lunch break in Ston where you can try numerous sea specialties including some with aphrodisiac properties!

Game of Thrones



“Those who seek paradise on Earth should come to Dubrovnik!” said the famous Irish playwright George Bernard Shaw. Situated in a fairy tale nature, carved by the skill of the human hand – Dubrovnik has persevered. Visiting Dubrovnik is like time travel. More than 1000 buildings in Dubrovnik are under the protection of UNESCO, which is the biggest testimony of the importance of this tourist gem. City streets were used as scenery in the famous TV show *Game of Thrones*, and a walk on city walls will give you insight into the way cities used to protect themselves from invasions. At the same time, you can marvel at numerous islands scattered in the sea. Dubrovnik was a small city-state that stretched all the way to Ston and included Pelješac. Defensive walls in Ston are a proof of Dubrovnik's former size. It thrived for years thanks to the diplomacy, craft and high standards of its merchants and seamen. Freedom – LIBERTAS – was the most appreciated value in Dubrovnik and stands as the city's motto, allowing for the development of entrepreneurship and bringing wealth to the city. Interestingly, the Doge was elected every month in order to prevent corruption and Dubrovnik was the first state in the world that banned slavery. The ingenuity of city authorities can be seen in an interesting event that took place during the construction of the Minčeta fort in 1464 when the town lacked construction stones. It was ordered that anyone who was coming to the city from the direction of Gruž or Ploče should bring a rock proportionate to their body structure. From whichever direction you are coming, you are welcome in Dubrovnik empty handed! Come and enjoy its beauty!



PLACES TO VISIT

In the footsteps of Marco Polo



Conquer the fortified town of Korčula! You will love its towers, walls, details and ornaments carved in stone by skilful hands of local stonemasons. It's a miracle what human hands can make out of seemingly plain, grey stone. However, here you will come to know the uniqueness of the stone. **Beauty awaits you every step of the way.** Korčula is the best-preserved medieval Croatian town with streets that you will fall in love with! Visit the birth house of Marco Polo – the famous Venetian merchant who described the adventures from his travels in his book "Il Milione". Try some of the gastronomic surprises and specialties of this lively island. A cultural delicacy is Moreška – a sword dance in which a white and a black king fight for the love of a girl! Who will win? Tread in the footsteps of Marco Polo, start in Korčula!

Venture out into the unknown



Board a boat and embark on an adventure of discovering a new, magical world. The oldest national park in Croatia – Mljet – will impress you with its unique natural beauty. The biggest attraction on this island is the system of two salt-water lakes in the middle of which stands a small island of Saint Mary with a convent. This creates an aesthetic ambience and adds a strong spiritual and cultural dimension to the island. Discover many hidden surprises on this wonderful island!

Did someone say aphrodisiac?



You just turned for Pelješac and you're in Ston. It's time for a break and a delicious meal! Treat yourself to sea specialties served in the cosy ambience of indigenous houses. This is a great place for trying famous Ston aphrodisiacs – oysters and mussels. Oysters from Ston – *Ostrea edulis* – are a famous natural aphrodisiac. Visit the stonewall which, in the time of the Republic of Ragusa, served as a defensive wall for this medieval town and enjoy the view of the famous saltern – the oldest in Europe – which produces excellent ecological salt and flower of salt thanks to the power of the sun, the sea, the wind and the skill of man!



PLACES TO VISIT

Secrets of hidden gardens



Take a look inside hidden gardens of beautiful houses of captains on the coast of Orebić and discover their secrets. The secret is in the plants that the famous sea captains brought home from their travels and planted in their gardens. Orebić was named after an aristocratic Orebić family – renowned sea captains, and was founded in the late 15th century on the territory of the Republic of Ragusa. It was shaped by sea captains and the art of shipbuilding. Learn more about it at the maritime museum. You will immediately fall in love with Orebić as you reach it through its exceptionally beautiful landscape. The best way to enjoy it is with a glass of some nice Pelješac wine made in the surroundings of Orebić!



PLACES TO VISIT

Kiss me... I'm from Nakovana



Meet Nakovana – one of the oldest villages on Pelješac, which, according to archaeological findings was inhabited as early as 6000 BC. In the cave Spila Nakovana, archaeologists found an Illyrian fertility sanctuary. There, before a phallic stalagmite, mysterious rites were held. Many inhabitants of coastal villages originally lived in Nakovana – in the inland region where they were safe from pirate attacks. According to legend, there were three blacksmith brothers. One day, they decided to divide their property. One brother got a small house – “kućište” – in which he lived and which he used as a smithy. Therefore, the nearby place got the name “Kućište”. The other brother got a blacksmith's forge – “viganj” – and moved to a place that was named Viganj after it. The third brother got an anvil – nakovanj – and the place where he decided to live was named “Nakovanj”. During antiquity, Nakovana was ruled by Illyrians who were based on a hill called GRAD and who fortified it with strong walls. According to legend, the fort sheltered great riches looted from Roman and Greek ships, but they were never found. Today, Nakovana has one resident. In Nakovana, you can pick asparagus in the spring, see donkeys and cows, and it has the easiest path that leads to St. Ilia's peak. It is also famous for its yearly festival and a mass that is held at the beginning of fall when the entire island of Pelješac gathers for a folk celebration. *Welcome!*

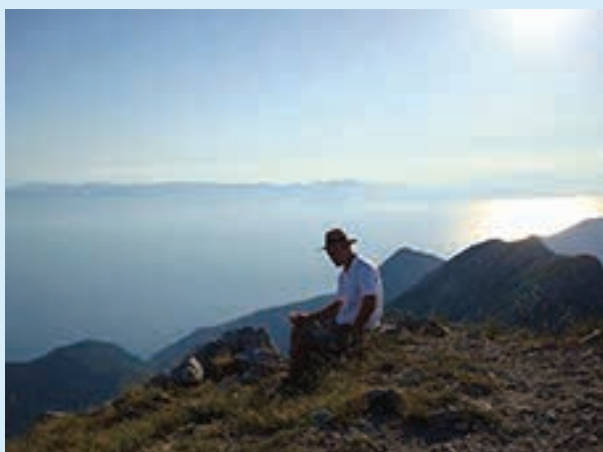


PLACES TO VISIT

Touch the sky



Early spring and fall are the best time to climb the highest peak of Pelješac, St. Ilia, from which you can see Italy when the bora blows. Because of its height and secludedness, it is one of the widest and most beautiful viewpoints in Croatia. Once on top, people realize how small they are in comparison with the magnificent nature and are thankful for being a part of it. St. Ilia's peak is full of endemic species, medicinal plants and herbs, and especially wild orchids, which bloom in May and June. The easiest path starts from Nakovana and it will take you 2.5 hours to reach the peak. Sign the guestbook at the peak marked with a wooden cross and an inscribed marble slab, and enjoy the heavenly view.



PLACES TO VISIT

Angels in your hair



If you want to feel angels in your hair and add a spiritual dimension to your travel, climb the hill above Orebić and visit the convent of Our Lady of the Angels! During the time of the Republic of Ragusa, this was a lookout from which the sea was watched against their eternal enemy, the Republic of Venice, positioned on Korčula. You will love the view of the Pelješac Canal with about 20 small islands. Visit the church and the museum in the convent! Try meat roasted under the bell from nearby restaurants! Take a souvenir angel with you to keep you safe on your travels!



Interesting facts

Did you know?:

- That Pelješac is the second largest Croatian peninsula with a surface of 348 km², an elevation that ranges from 1 to 962 m and a population of 8000 people, most of which live in Orebić.
- That Pelješac is 77 km long with a coastline of 200 km, 35 of which are at cape Lovište.
- That Lovište is the youngest settlement on the peninsula and that its first resident came here in 1878 from Hvar. He was later joined by women from Nakovana. Lovište now counts 250 residents and the first tourists arrived as early as 1935.
- That in all of Croatia, only the Dalmatian coast and Islands have a real Mediterranean climate and the number of hours of sunshine in Lovište rises to 3000 hours a year which is more than the sunniest island of Hvar situated opposite Lovište.
- That Lovište, in comparison with the predominantly upland landscape of Pelješac, has a gentle relief, has no traffic and is situated in a bay that protects it from strong winds.
- That the highest peak of Pelješac is St. Ilija (962 m) and is one of the most beautiful viewpoints in Croatia as well as one of the richest sites of wild orchids in Croatia.
- That the jackal – a subspecies of coyote, which howls in the night – can be found only on Pelješac, primarily in Lovište.
- That in the waters of Lovište you can find the largest endangered seashells in the Adriatic – the pen shell that inhabits only clean waters.
- That Lovište has over 100 species of birds.
- That the best wines in Croatia are made in Lovište and that Dingač and Postup are the first protected Croatian wines (1961/1967).
- That Pelješac is the most important Croatian shellfish breeding ground, especially the Bay of Mali Ston and the coast of Brijesta.
- That Viganj on Pelješac is one of the world's most famous surfing and kite-surfing places thanks to strong winds in the Pelješac Canal.
- That the biggest settlements are located in the inland parts of Pelješac because of a several centuries old farming tradition, and because of the frequency of pirate attacks.
- That Pelješac was a principality within the Republic of Ragusa and the seat of the Doge was in Ston, which had a strategic importance in the control of sailing around Neretva and in the Mljet Canal.
- That the Republic of Ragusa was abolished by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1808, after which it became part of Austria-Hungary, and interestingly, during its short reign on these territories, the French built several roads that are still used today.
- That Dubrovnik had 40 000 inhabitants in the 15th century and was one of the largest cities in Europe. At the time, London had 40 000 inhabitants and Florence 100 000.
- That in the 16th century, the naval fleet of the Republic of Ragusa had around 40 000 sailors and 180 large ships and was one of the biggest fleets in the Mediterranean.
- That Orebić was the seat of the Doge from the 14th century to the 19th century. It was also an important shipbuilding centre where most of Ragusan merchant navy ships were made.
- That Dubrovnik boasts with 1436 buildings under the protection of UNESCO.
- That the Trsteno Arboretum near Dubrovnik was founded in the 15th century and is the oldest arboretum in the world.
- That Mljet is the oldest national park established in 1960 and occupies one third of the island's surface.
- That the Island of Korčula, located just across from Pelješac has been inhabited since the Roman and Greek times, is the sixth largest Croatian island and the second most populated island after Krk with a population of around 16 000.
